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COURSE OBJECTIVES

In the Honors College, we think in terms of liberal education rather than credits. A broad education at UNT will be the foundation for a lifetime of learning. There may be no more exciting and important part of your education than a study abroad experience that will change your life for years to come.

The Honors Capstone Seminar is designed to be the culmination of peak of your combined Honors classes. Gaining a global perspective will require us to study issues from several disciplines including history, literature, philosophy, politics, as well as our observations from our experiences in London and the surrounding area.

Your Capstone experience will require you to draw upon almost all of the classes you have taken thus far at UNT.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Honors courses emphasize development of analytical and evaluative skills through readings from primary sources, journal articles and other supplementary materials.
- 2. Honors courses encourage students to engage in high-level thinking and learning through activities such as intensive discussion; writing in small, collaborative learning settings; and intensive research papers and projects.
- 3. Honors courses promote independent thinking by making students accountable for important aspects of their learning.

- 4. Honors courses place material in a conceptual context that illustrates its importance and relationship to other knowledge.
- 5. Honors courses provide enhanced opportunities for students to develop research skills and produce independent, original research or creative products as part of the course requirements.
- 6. Honors courses include innovative approaches to course content and teaching so that honors courses can serve as campus-wide prototypes.

A large portion of your grade for HNRS 4000 will be determined by active participation in course activities. These activities will be a vital part of gathering research for your written assignments as well.
